



## **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE COUNTS REPORT**TEXAS SUMMARY

On September 9, 2021, **77** out of **88** (**88%**) identified domestic violence programs in Texas participated in a national count of domestic violence services conducted by the National Network to End Domestic Violence (NNEDV). In 2021, frontline advocates continued to navigate unforeseen challenges due to the COVID-19 pandemic and other crises. The following figures represent the information shared by the participating programs about the services they provided during the 24-hour survey period.

## 6,113 Victims Served in One Day

**3,909** adult and child victims of domestic violence found refuge in emergency shelters, transitional housing, hotels, motels, or other housing provided by local domestic violence programs.

**2,204** non-residential adult and child victims received supportive services including counseling, legal advocacy, and support groups.

## 1,562 Hotline Contacts Received

Domestic violence hotlines are lifelines for victims in danger, providing support, information, safety planning, and resources via phone, chat, text, and email. Hotline staff received **1,562** contacts, averaging more than **65** contacts per hour.

## 1,122 Unmet Requests for Services

Victims made **1,122** requests for services—including emergency shelter, housing, transportation, childcare, legal representation, and other support needs—that programs could not provide because they lacked the resources. Approximately **56%** of these unmet requests were for housing and emergency shelter.

There is a tremendous need for increased funding to ensure programs can provide comprehensive services to all survivors seeking help while working toward preventing violence in their communities.
